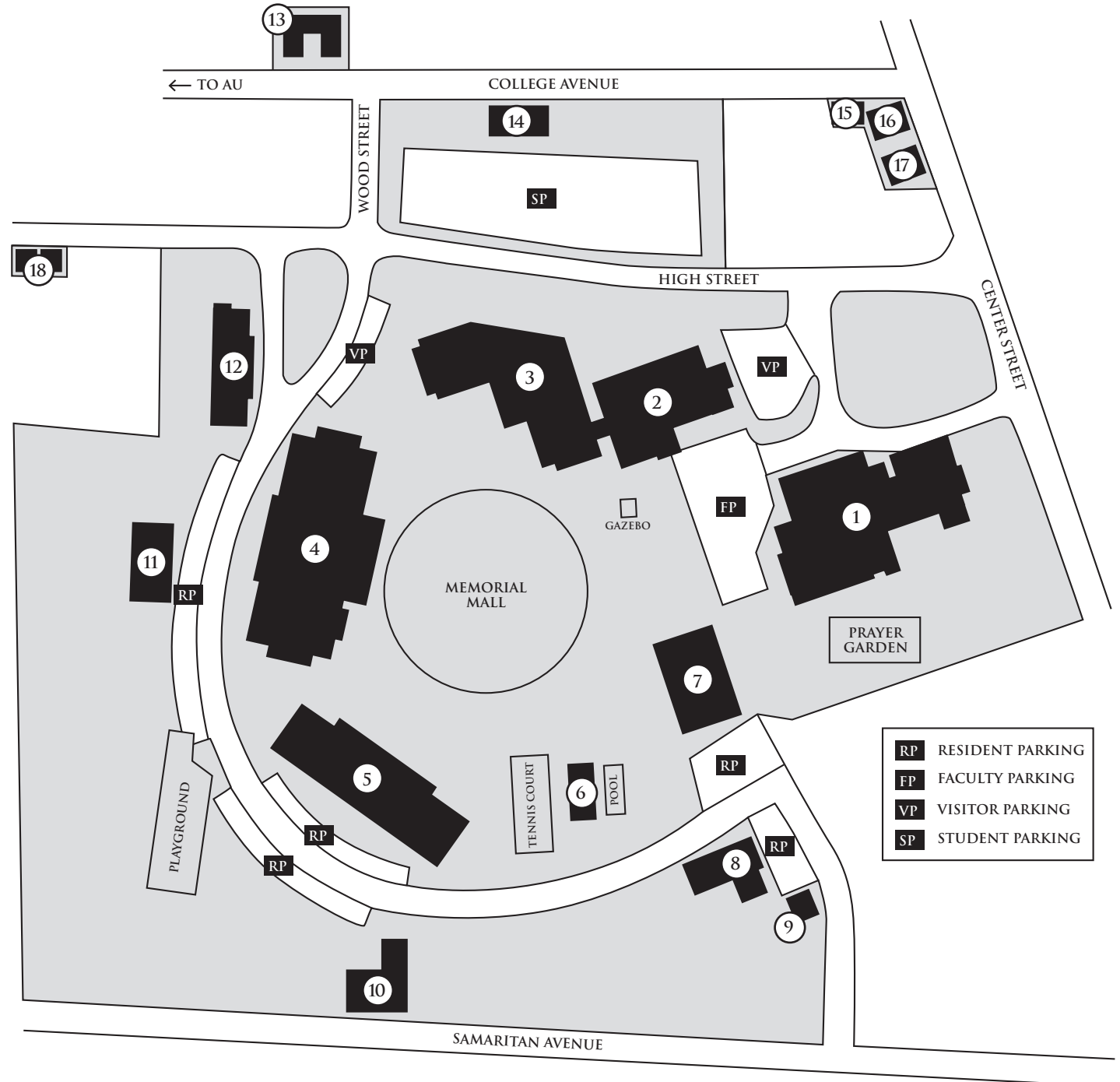

Campus Tour

- 1. Administration and Library:** The Administration building is the former home of John C. Myers, an Ashland Industrialist. It was built in 1912 and then given to the Seminary in 1958 when the Seminary moved from the Ashland University campus to the Center St. location. The library was built in 1965, with the wrap around section completed in 1958.
- 2. Shultz Academic Center:** The center was built in 1989 in recognition of the contribution of Joe and Doris Shultz to the life of the Seminary. Joe became dean in 1963 and served until 1980. The school received initial accreditation during his tenure.
- 3. The Gerber Academic Center:** Built in 1997 and dedicated to the honor of God by Harley and Fae Gerber, a Mennonite couple who believe in our work and ministry.
- 4. The Sandberg Leadership Center:** Built in 2001 and dedicated in honor of Buzz and Ann Sandberg for their commitment to excellence in leadership. Buzz is chairman of the Board of Trustees for Ashland University and Seminary.
- 5. Hoseck Apartments:** Built in 1971 through a contribution from Leon and Ruth Hoseck from Dallas, Texas. They were members of the United Methodist Church.
- 6. Pool and Tennis Courts:** Originally part of the Miller Estate
- 7. Ronk Memorial Chapel:** Built in 1978 and dedicated to the memory of the Ronk Brothers who were active leaders in the Brethren Church. The building epitomizes the "Believer's Church" model with no raised platform and no stained glass windows (open to the world around it).
- 8. Mack Manor:** Acquired in 1969. Named in memory of Alexander Mack, early Brethren Leader.
- 9. Maintenance/Garden House**
- 10. Holsinger House:** Acquired in 1964, originally the servant quarters for the Miller Estate. Named in memory of Henry Holsinger, leader of the Progressive Movement of the Brethren Church.
- 11. Schmeidt Apartments:** Built in 1972. Student Housing. Named in memory of Lester Schmeidt by Mrs. Frances Schmeidt.
- 12. Rodkey Apartments:** Built in 1974. Student Housing. Named in memory of Russell and Edith Rodkey, long time members of the Brethren Church and trustee of Ashland Theological Seminary.
- 13. The Miller Leadership Residence Inn:** Acquired in 2001. Commuter Housing for Ashland Seminary Students. Named in honor of Ken and Lois Miller, longtime friends and supporters of Ashland Theological Seminary.
- 14. The Allison House:** Commuter Housing for Ashland Seminary Students. Named in honor of Dr. Richard Allison, Emeritus Professor of Christian Education.
- 15. Student Housing**
- 16. The Flora House:** Student Housing. Named in honor of Dr. Jerry Flora, Emeritus Professor of Spiritual Formation and Theology.
- 17. China House:** A gift from Buzz and Ann Sandberg in 2000, for continuing commitment to their vision for reaching China through the training of Chinese students.
